It has been the usual busy start to the year with Year 9 transition and peer support days, our Big 'Arvo Out' and the House Sports' Day. It was Great to see the effort and commitment that both staff and students put into making these days such a success.



At the 1st of March return there are a total of 177 students who identify as Māori on our roll. 40 Year 9s, 40 Year 10s, 47 Year 11s, 27 Year 12s and 23 Year 13s. Retention is a schoolwide strategic goal, and this is clearly reflected in this data.

The Māori department has hit the ground running for 2016 as we continue to develop the students' knowledge and understanding of te ao Māori. Matua Teina has returned as the kaiako for Māori and Māori Performing Arts and he will be supported by Whaea Leanne, our kaiāwhina.

The Junior Māori classes are focussing on who they are and where they come from for the most part of Term One and the Senior Māori class is looking at influential Māori figures of the past and of today. The key focus for all of the classes is to encourage verbal interaction between all students inside the classroom and outside of the classroom.

The Kapa Haka has begun training for the upcoming Arts Expo towards the end of this term and although the majority of the members are junior students, there is already a strong sense of whanaungatanga within this group. Two students and members of the school haka group, Vaughn Atkins-Percasky (13LRA) and Harlem Tangaroa (10SCH), are also practising and trialling for a senior haka group from Christchurch, Ngā Manu a Tāne. With the aim of performing at the Senior Regional Kapa Haka competition in May. We wish them both well in their pursuit for selection.

There are some notable events coming up including, the Arts Expo, the Manu Kōrero competition and Open Night, where our Māori students will take part and showcase their identity and culture. So keep an ear out for those, closer to the time.

Congratulations also to these students who gained credits in Level 2 NCEA Te Reo, as Year 10 Students – JJ Gage and Braxton Taua.

At Level 1 overall Māori student achievement was down slightly on the 2014 results. At Level 1 60% of females achieved Level 1 compared to 47% of boys.

At Level 2 Māori female student achievement was up considerably on the 2014 results with 77% achieving Level 2, compared to 50% of boys.

Overall Level 3 achievement for Māori boys was up considerably with 67% achieving Level 3, but there was a considerable drop in girls achieving Level 3, 42%.

Kia Eke Panuku/ Building on Success – The journey continues – 'Addressing the aspirations of Māori communities by supporting Māori students to achieve their potential'

On January 27th we held our second hui whakarewa, welcoming 24 teachers into our school's journey towards best practice teaching in order to enable academic success for Māori learners. Here they were introduced to Kia Eke Panuku and its underlying principles and values. The day was presented by members of the Strategic Change Team (SCT) and members of last year's cohort. We now have 44 staff (including the lead strategic change team) who will be regularly observed by a member of the SCT. Every observation is followed up by a feedback discussion or 'shadow coaching'. A goal is then co-constructed and the cycle of professional learning continues.

Mel Anderson has be reappointed co-ordinator of the SCT, and Keith Anderson has been appointed as assistant co-ordinator. The other members of the SCT are Jason Fahey (Assistant Curriculum Leader), Mary Himiona (Curriculum Leader), Bruce McMillan (Curriculum Leader), Alison Cleary (Acting Deputy Principal) and Julia Malcolm (Acting Principal).

On the 9th and 10th of March members of the SCT will attend the first regional hui Of the year. Sharing practice across schools is an integral part of the journey.
